Reservists Gather for All-Hands Call

A Naval Reserve leader visited recently with "citizen Sailors" deployed to Bahrain.

Reserve Rear Adm. John A. Jackson spoke with Reserve Sailors Dec. 16 at an all-hands call at Naval Support Activity, Bahrain.

Jackson, the Deputy Director (Reserve) of Plans and Policy for U.S. Central Command, addressed issues facing the Reserves. He first underlined the main struggle for many Reservists: juggling their family, civilian job, and the Navy. He commended the gathered service members for "answering the call when the nation needed you."

However, Jackson explained, the need is evolving. Currently the Navy is reviewing information gathered for a zero-base review to redefine the Naval Reserve's role. The review is to clearly state the status of Reserve forces and their tasking.

Jackson bluntly told the gathered service members until the review is concluded, "the future of the Naval Reserve is a huge question mark."

Some are worried the review means cut-

ting back on manning, but "it's not about more or less. It is about efficiency," Jackson said in response to one Reserve Sailor's question.

The 33-year veteran of naval service explained he is seeing more changes than anytime else in his career. The changes include centralizing the Reserve organization and streamlining their efforts. Most of these changes fall under another ongoing evolution, Active Reserve Integration (ARI).

"ARI is working hard towards one Navy much like what I see here in Bahrain," Jackson said of Reservists' integration with local Navy commands. Throughout, he stressed that both the active and Reserve communities had the same mission summing it up by saying, "one team, one fight."

Jackson, who is also Commander, Naval Reserve Readiness Command South where he supervises the training and administration of more than 11,700 Reservists in 29 Naval Reserve Centers, noted Navy leadership has a complete understanding and appreciation of

the Reserve Force.

Jackson reminded the audience that Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Vernon Clark is the first CNO to have broken service and served in the Reserve.

When out of uniform, Jackson is an American Airlines Boeing 777 captain based out of Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport. ✎

Junior Sailor Assoc. Contest Raises Funds for Fallen Enterprise Sailor

ABOARD USS ENTERPRISE -- The deployment of *USS Enterprise (CVN 65)* started on a somber note with the unexpected loss of Fireman Jakia Cannon, who died of natural causes Oct. 25.

Cannon had only been on board for a little more than a month, but in that short time, she quickly got involved in the command, singing in the choir and even participating in the Junior Sailor Association (JSA) talent show. Her passing was a shock to her shipmates, who also came to consider her a friend.

Cannon's shipmates haven't forgotten her. On Dec. 14, the JSA sponsored a fundraiser in Cannon's honor. The "FN Cannon Pie-in-the-Face" fundraiser was a

huge success for the association, raising more than \$1,500.

JSA members began planning a fundraiser for Cannon's family in early November.

"It was just something good we wanted to do for her and her family," explained JSA President DT2(SW) Hakim Mathis. "It started out with us trying to get a shadowbox done for her. While we were waiting on different materials to finish it up, we decided to have the fundraiser."

"The Navy is a big family," said Big E Command Master Chief (SW/AW) Mike Oldknow. "We look after each other and take care of one another. Fireman Cannon lost her life while serving her country. Her family is forever part of the Navy family now, and we owe it to them to take care of them as best as we can."

On Dec. 1, the association started actively planning the "Pie-in-the-Face" event. Any Big E Sailor could nominate a fellow shipmate to receive a pie in the face, and then all hands voted for their top ten picks. Votes were 25 cents each, and the ten nominees with the most votes won the honor of taking a good-natured pie to the face.

Nominees ranged from Deck department 4th division Leading Petty Officer BM1(SW/CC) John Ransom to Engineering department's Electrical Officer, Lt. Cmdr. Thomas Harrill. Harrill was the fundraiser's top vote-getter, with 676 votes for a grand total of \$169. JSA collected a total of \$630 in votes alone.

On pie night, the top ten met in the aft mess decks where JSA members auctioned off pies. While one Sailor bid \$100 to smear cheesecake on the Command Mas-

ter Chief and Big E's Executive Officer, Capt. Michael Chase, the evening's top bid of \$300 went for ABHC(AW) David Vinal of Air department's V-3 division.

Oldknow was happy to participate for such a worthwhile cause. "It was the right thing to do," he said. "When a Sailor's family is less fortunate, anything we can do to help is a good thing. It just goes to show that we are a family. It's a Navy tradition, and our heritage is built around the bonds we have as shipmates."

Ransom agreed. "Even though Fireman Cannon is no longer with us, we were able to come together to do something to help her family." Nominees had the option of buying out their votes to avoid wearing pie, but Ransom had a better idea. "I thought about buying out my votes, but I figured I could help them raise more money by auctioning off the pies."

Of the more than \$1,500 raised, \$900 of it came from auctioning off the pies. JSA plans to send the money to Cannon's 14-year-old brother Joshua, a freshman in high school, for his future education.

"The Sailors who organized this fundraiser are going to be heroes in that boy's eyes because of what they did for him," emphasized Oldknow. "This is just one example of how the Navy takes care of its own. Fireman Cannon had great aspirations for her brother. Her shipmates are carrying on with that by helping her brother become the young man Fireman Cannon wanted him to become."

Cannon is not the only member of her family to serve in the Navy. Her uncle is an Information Systems Technician Petty Officer First Class, and has orders to report to *USS Enterprise* February of 2004. The Enterprise Junior Sailor Association plans to present him with Cannon's shadowbox when he reports aboard.

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MCPON visits USS Peleliu Sailors, Marines

ABOARD USS PELELIU- Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (MCPON) (SS/AW) Terry Scott visited *USS Peleliu* (LHA 5) in the Arabian Gulf, Saturday, Dec. 13.

Scott came aboard *Peleliu* to talk with enlisted Sailors at an All-Hands Call. He began his visit with an *Expeditionary Strike Group ONE (ESG 1)* briefing in the ship's War Room and then had lunch with those Sailors who most recently advanced to the rank of Chief Petty Officer.

At the afternoon All-Hands Call on the flight deck, Scott did the honor of pinning those who had recently qualified as Enlisted Aviation Warfare Specialists and Enlisted Surface Warfare Specialists. He then helped to relax the Sailors by having them fall out of formation and gather around him so he could talk to them on a more personal level.

Once everyone moved close to him, Scott made what he called a "Public Service Announcement" discussing the importance of saving for your future and used the "Thrift Savings Plan" as an example. "It is a personal choice that each Sailor must make and deserves serious thought," said Scott.

MCPON Scott Visits USS Enterprise in UAE

ABOARD USS ENTERPRISE -- Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (SS/AW) Terry Scott visited Sailors from *USS Enterprise* (CVN 65) Dec. 12 during the ship's port visit to Jebel Ali, United Arab Emirates. Scott held an all hands call with the crew and reenlisted 15 Big E Sailors.

Scott opened his remarks by commenting on the job *Enterprise* Sailors are doing in the war on terrorism. "I don't think anybody has had forces over Iraq, Afghanistan and the Horn of Africa all at the same time before. When I hear about *Enterprise* doing it, it fills me with a great amount of pride and satisfaction knowing the great work all of you are doing out here."

Scott discussed several issues including Perform to Serve, Task Force Uniform, and the Thrift Savings Plan (TSP). "Folks can contribute to their future financial security without interfering with the things they want to do, the things they need to do, or even the

He then spoke about the importance of the Navy's role in the world and about the personal initiative and motivation of each Sailor to seek advancement. "When I was a Third Class Petty Officer, I wanted the Second Class's job; when I was a Second Class, I wanted the Leading Petty

Officer's job," Scott said.

Scott then opened the floor to questions from enlisted Sailors. Among issues discussed were Navy uniforms, the length of *Peleliu's* deployment and return date to San Diego, and rate conversions.

things they like to do and they can do it without putting a crimp in their lifestyle," said Scott about TSP, which will allow Sailors to increase their contributions to a maximum of nine percent of their base pay starting in January. "I'm interested in this because I want my Sailors to know that they can have financial security in their future. I don't want to see our Sailors sacrifice financial security for the purposes of serving their country."

Scott took time to answer questions from Big E Sailors, including one about Perform to Serve. "One of the primary contributors of overmanned rates is unrestricted reenlistment behavior," he explained. "Before we started Perform to Serve there was no centrally located method for controlling reenlistment. We could have one rate with tremendous advancement opportunities and another with very poor advancement. We had to find a way to fix that. By centrally locating reenlistments, we can offer better advancement opportunities."

Scott also encouraged each Sailor to look ahead and try to emulate the successful leaders. "What I would suggest to each of you is

to work to become your boss. Work to become the people who you respect and work to become the people who do the job that our Navy needs so much.

"It's a two way street," Scott added. "I need our petty officers to try hard to become the squared away petty officer that the seamen, airmen and firemen need to be."

After completing the all-hands call, Scott took time out stop and talk with Sailors in the crowd and pose for pictures before traveling to visit Sailors aboard *USS Gettysburg* (CG 64), also enjoying a port visit in Jebel Ali. *Gettysburg* is part of the *Enterprise* Carrier Strike Group, the only strike group currently deployed in the 5th Fleet.

Enterprise left its homeport of Norfolk, Va., on August 29th, and has conducted a variety of missions in support of both Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom in the first three months of the deployment. The visit to Jebel Ali was the second for the Sailors, who were recalled during an early November visit to provide air support to troops in Afghanistan.

Enterprise CSG Deploys Unmanned Surface Vehicle

On Dec. 1, *USS Gettysburg* (CG 64) and the entire Enterprise Carrier Strike Group (CSG) wrote a new page in the history books with the successful launch of Spartan Scout. Spartan Scout, a Rigid Hull Inflatable Boat (RHIB) with an enhanced engine and hi-tech camera and sensor gear, completed an unmanned, three-hour mission driven remotely from three laptop computers in the Combat Direction Center on board *Gettysburg*.

The need for unmanned vehicles came into focus several years ago when President George W. Bush remarked that "It is clear that the military does not have enough unmanned vehicles."

Two years ago the Naval Undersea Warfare Center (NUWC) in Newport, R.I., started development on the first remote-controlled surface vehicle. The resulting creation, Spartan Scout, has since been developed ahead of schedule to deploy with the Enterprise CSG aboard *Gettysburg*, responsible for conducting operational testing and assessing its real-world uses.

According to a *Gettysburg* spokesman, this was the first unmanned operation of the Spartan Scout from a U.S. warship at sea, and marks a significant milestone in the future development of the Spartan Scout Unmanned Surface Vessel.

Spartan Scout has been found very versatile, requiring manpower only for launch and recovery, and capable of being driven through its own remote-controlled navigation system.

"A two man boat crew launches Spartan, conducts system checks and then it operates in an unmanned mode for

the duration of the mission," said Cmdr. Chuck Tamblyn, air operations officer for Commander, Cruiser/Destroyer Group 12. "This variant of Spartan is designed primarily for surface surveillance and force protection but future versions will be capable of conducting several, more complex missions."

"This unmanned surface vessel (USV) expands your sensor range and situational awareness without exposing boat crews to rough seas or weather," said Tamblyn. "The crew operates the USV from the comfort and safety of the control module in CDC. Its sensors feeding information directly the operators."

Rear Adm. James Stavridis, Commander, Enterprise Carrier Strike Group, says Spartan Scout has many practical uses in today's multi-faceted and multi-tasked Navy. "Using a forward-looking infrared/CCD camera, Spartan Scout can provide surveillance in a harbor, not only for Navy ships but for U.S. Coast Guard units responsible for port security as well," said Stavridis. He added that it could provide reconnaissance for ships passing through maritime chokepoints as well. "The unmanned surface vehicle is a harbinger of transformation."

Stavridis foresees more than scouting in the prototype's future. He predicts a wide range of missions and combat focuses that Spartan Scout would be ideal for.

"Spartan Scout could be modified for mine detection or anti-submarine warfare," said Stavridis. "When equipped with a Hellfire or Javelin missile, it could attack other surface vehicles or conduct precision strikes ashore."

Gettysburg completed operational testing with Spartan Scout Dec. 12 and sent results to NUWC for evaluation

Scott explained that the Navy was doing research and trying to find ways to lessen the number of different Navy uniforms. The number of uniforms in the Navy has been a big concern with enlisted members due to the amount of space required to stow them properly.

MCPON ended the All-Hands call by discussing what he believes is important to today's Sailors. Knowing what we do is important, that the Navy cares, and that we are appreciated by those back home, are the three things that every Sailor needs to know, Scott explained.

Scott relayed to "Mighty Liu's Warriors" that people back stateside thank him every day for what he is doing, and he wanted to pass that thanks on to the Sailors of *USS Peleliu*.

Scott then took the time to shake the hands of several Sailors as he walked through the crowd and to thank them for the hard work they put forth each day.

MCPON serves as the senior enlisted leader of the Navy and is an advisor to the Chief of Naval Operations and to the Chief of Naval Personnel in matters dealing with enlisted personnel and their families.

Peleliu is the Flagship for *ESG 1* and home ported in San Diego. *ESG 1* has been deployed since August 22, 2003.

A Great Miracle Happened There

Hanukah, the Jewish Festival of Lights begins at sunset on Friday, December 19, 2003, and for eight days commemorates the world's first recorded victory in the struggle for religious freedom. In the second century B.C.E. the Syrian Emperor, Antiochus Epiphanes controlled Israel. He decreed that all people of Jerusalem had to worship Greek gods in their temple and even bow down before an idol of the emperor himself. With all these forced changes to their worship, the people could no longer practice their own religion in Jerusalem. Then the religious oppression began to spread throughout the countryside until a family of priests rose up and defeated the emperor. Mattathias the Hasmonean, his son Judah the Maccabee, and Judah's four brothers led this revolt that ended on the 25th of the Hebrew month of Kislev with the rededication (Hanukkah) of the Jerusalem temple. Every year since then, a thanksgiving holiday of rededication is celebrated to remember the victory of a minority in the battle for religious freedom.

Legend has it that there wasn't enough oil available in the newly cleansed temple to last the whole of the eight-day festival of rededication. And yet, miraculously, the oil of one small cruse did last, and kept the sacred menorah (lamp) burning bright in the holy sanctuary. Nowadays, whether we celebrate

at the synagogue or at home, we remember the miracle by using a candle (called the Shamas sexton) to kindle a new candle for each day of the holiday. Including the Shamas, there are two candles lit the first day, three, the second day, and a candle is added each day from the right of the menorah, while a candle is lit from the left side.

Family and friends exchange gifts throughout the holiday. Potato pancakes and jelly donuts are favorites for holiday treats because they are cooked in oil. Psalms of Thanksgiving are recited daily in the prayer service when the candles are lit each evening.

In order to involve the younger children, a game of dreidle is played. After the players, "ante up," their candy, each child spins a four-sided top called a dreidl. Hebrew letters on each side of the dreidl determine how much candy the child wins when the dreidl falls with that letter face up. It's really taking a chance on Hanukkah because the four letters also spell out the beginning of a Hanukkah message: "A Great Miracle Happened There."

Port Visit Hole-In-One for "Big E" Golfer

ABOARD USS ENTERPRISE-- The odds of scoring a hole-in-one on a typical par-3 golf hole are approximately 45,000 to one, according to Sports Illustrated. Cmdr. Brian Broene, assistant air officer on board *USS Enterprise (CVN-65)*, beat those odds and accomplished the rarest of golf feats by scoring a hole-in-one Dec. 12 in the USS Enterprise Carrier Strike Group Gold tournament held during Big E's port visit to Jebel Ali, United Arab Emirates.

The par-3, 17th hole of the Montgomerie Golf Course in nearby Dubai set the scene as Broene, also known as Air department's "Mini Boss," approached the tee with his 8-iron in hand.

"I was hitting my irons poorly off the tee all morning so it was pretty ironic," said Broene.

"My swing was perfect and the ball landed then rolled about 25 feet toward the cup. The ball seemed to roll out of view and we weren't sure if it had gone in."

Golf etiquette demands at least one witness to every hole-in-one. Broene had three witnesses, one of whom was Big E Air Officer, Capt. Kelly Baragar.

"I looked at him and said, 'That either rolled off the green into the trap or it rolled into the hole. I think it went into the hole.'" said Baragar. "He looked back at me and said 'I think it went into the hole too.'"

Sensing the excitement and drama of the moment Baragar refused to tee off until someone checked the cup.

"I couldn't hit my shot until I knew if it was a hole-in-one," said Baragar.

The evidence was resting at the bottom of the hole.
